

Land Registry England & Wales Turning Data into Smart Information

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- Government department created in 1862
- Registers the ownership of property in England & Wales alongside a variety of other property information
- Provides state backed guarantee of title ownership
- Over 24 million titles in the register
- 5 million property transactions per year

- Traditionally offered statutory Land Registration services only
- Open Access to individual titles only since 1990
- Increased focus on data provision
- Corporate vision is now 'To be recognised as a world leader in the digital delivery of world registration services <u>and in the management and reuse of land and</u> <u>property data</u>'
- Working to support economic growth and data transparency
- Working to use digital technologies to enhance performance and support cities and regions in ambitious improvement initiatives




This is a simple but effective borough-by-borough cartogram of the median house price in London. The map appears on the London Data Store


